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About Lost Connections


Lost Connections is a new archive short film created in response to our extraordinary collective experiences since March 2020.

It is not a film about the pandemic, it is a film about recovery from feelings of loss, loneliness and isolation to the joy of renewal, and hope for the future as we gradually reconnect with each other, and with our communities and surroundings.

Commissioned by the BFI Film Audience Network, Lost Connections opened up a unique opportunity for national and regional film archive curators to come together to share their collections and knowledge, and create this new film, drawing on over a century of archive footage that reflects back and responds to the changing national mood throughout the coronavirus pandemic.

The Lost Connections short film, accompanying guide and social media packages have all been designed for exhibitors to use freely as part of their reopening programmes.

Lost Connections is completely free to book from July 2021. The short is available for both in-venue and online screenings, and is also available as a captioned version.

Creating Lost Connections

Lost Connections presented curators from the twelve national and regional archives across the UK with the opportunity to come together to explore how their collections could respond to the tumultuous time we have all been through.

The search uncovered imagery and voices on film, video and born-digital formats that resonated with the feelings of uncertainty and disconnection but that also conveyed a collective desire for reconnection with people, community and nature.

Using the source material from over 500 films, Andy Burns - editor and filmmaker at Yorkshire Film Archive - meticulously crafted a dialogue between the past and the present, using over 200 of the films put forward by the archive curators.

As an echo of our own contemporary experiences, artist and performer Hussina Raja provided a connecting voice, responding to the imagery with a common and recurring thread that weaves through the film: 'Can we always be connected?'

We might be feeling diminished by the pandemic and there is much to reflect on, but there is also much to live for too.

Lost Connections contains footage from over 200 films held by the UK's regional and national film archives.

Each of the films featured in *Lost Connections* has its own historical integrity in terms of its subject, form and nature (e.g. gauge, black & white, colour, silent, sound, length) as well as its own production, exhibition and legal contexts.

A home movie documenting various weddings, happy domestic scenes and family trips to the beach throughout the 40s and 50s.
